P –Lord Jesus, forgive our neglecting to pray together with the other members of our family. Christ, have mercy!

All –**Christ, have mercy!**

P –Lord Jesus, forgive our lack of concern for the welfare and the peace of the greater family that is our parish. Lord, have mercy!

All –**Lord, have mercy!**

P –May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life.

All –**Amen!**

All –Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks

for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father.

LITURGY OF THE WORD



1st Reading *Sir 3:2-6.12-14*

The respectful attitude of the children toward their parents is a very important factor in building up a happy family. Such is the truth inculcated by the pious author Ben Sira in today's First Reading.

R —A proclamation from the Book of Sirach

God sets a father in honor over his children; a mother's authority he confirms over her sons.

Whoever honors his father atones for sins, and preserves himself from them. When he prays, he is heard; he stores up riches who reveres his mother.

Whoever honors his father is gladdened by children, and, when he prays, is heard. Whoever reveres his father will live a long life; he who obeys his father brings comfort to his mother.

My son, take care of your father when he is old; grieve him not, as long as he lives. Even if his mind fail, be considerate of him; revile him not all the days of his life. Kindness to a father will not be forgotten, firmly planted against the debt of your sins — a house raised in justice to you.



R —A proclamation from the Letter of Paul to the Colossians

Brothers and sisters: Put on, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if one has a grievance against another. As the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do. And over all these, put on love, that is, the bond of perfection. And let the peace of Christ control your hearts, the peace into which you were also called in one body. And be thankful.

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, as in all wisdom you teach and admonish one another, singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God.

Whatever you do, in word or in deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Wives, be subordinate to your husbands, as is proper in the Lord. Husbands, love your wives, and avoid any bitterness toward them. Children, obey your parents in everything, for this is pleasing to the Lord. Fathers, do not provoke your children, so they may not become discouraged.

Gospel *Lk 2:41-52*

The Holy Family of Nazareth was deeply devout and followed carefully the religious observances of the people of Israel. Such is the impression we derive from today's Gospel passage which is usually known as "the Finding of Jesus in the Temple."

P —A proclamation from the holy Gospel according to Luke

All—**Glory to you, O Lord!**

Each year Jesus' parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, and when he was twelve years old, they went up according to festival custom. After they had completed its days, as they were returning, the boy Jesus remained behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. Thinking that he was in the caravan, they journeyed for a day and looked for him among their relatives and acquaintances, but not finding him they returned to Jerusalem to look for him. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions, and all who heard him were astounded at his understanding and his answers. When his parents saw him, they were astonished, and his mother said to him, "Son, why have you done this to us? Your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety." And he said to them, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" But they did not understand what he said to them.

He went down with them and came to Nazareth, and

was obedient to them; and his mother kept all these things in her heart. And Jesus advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man.

Homily

Profession of Faith (Nicene Creed)

All—I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, (bow)* and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.* For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen!

C —For our own family: May the peace of Christ reign in each of our members, and may a selfless love keep us united in mutual forgiveness and solidarity. Let us pray! **R.**

C —Let us pray in silence for our personal intentions. (Pause)

P —Lord God, bless all families throughout the world. Bring all the members of every family closer to you and to one another, and keep them in your peace and love. Through Christ our Lord.

MAKING OUR FAMILIES HAPPY AND HOLY

Praying together as a family seems no longer fashionable nowadays. The reasons are varied: so many commitments, conflicts of schedule, practical impossibility of being together . . . There are, of course, happy exceptions of parents who, every evening, gather their children for some moments of reflection on the Word of God, reconciliation, shared prayer, and recitation of the Rosary. These same people are the ones who, on Sundays, attend the Eucharistic celebration as a family. From this, they derive strength, harmony, cohesion. And at the same time, they become an inspiration to the whole parish community. It is when the family gathers together for prayer that its members – both parents and children – see themselves under the common fatherly authority of God.

A family that renews every day its covenant with the Lord will have no time for endless bickerings, jealousy, unfaithfulness, harsh manners


on the part of the parents, or rebellion on the part of their children.

It is also an invitation and encouragement to make our families today what the family of Joseph, Mary, and Jesus was in those days – a haven of love of God and neighbor at its best, a home where God felt at home.

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
