## Called to Bear Fruits of Holiness

**G**od's patience and goodness with us during this Lenten journey should not be taken to mean that there is nothing to change in our behavior. It can only mean that the Lord, in His patient love for us, is waiting for us to produce the fruits of a sincere and lasting conversion.

We should not think that conversion consists only in avoiding sin. ### LITURGY OF THE WORD



#### 1st Reading *Ex 3:1-8a.13-15*

*Continuing the presentation of the highlights of Salvation History, the sacred author today describes two very im-*

portant events in the history of the people of Israel: the baring of God's plan to set His people free and the revelation of His name.

**R** –A proclamation from the Book of Exodus

Moses was tending the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian. Leading the flock across the desert, he came to *Horeb*, the mountain of God.

There an angel of the Lord appeared to Moses in fire flaming out of a bush. As he looked on, he was surprised to see that the bush, though on fire, was not consumed. So Moses decided, "I must go over to look at this remarkable sight, and see why the bush is not burned." When the Lord saw him coming over to look at it more closely, God called out to him from the bush, "Moses! Moses!" He answered, "Here I am." God said, "Come no nearer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place where you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your fathers," he continued, "the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob."

Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God. But the Lord said, "I have witnessed the affliction of my people in Egypt and have heard their cry of complaint against their slave drivers, so I know well what they are suffering. Therefore I have come down to rescue them from the hands of the Egyptians and lead them out of that land into a good and spacious land, a land flowing with milk and honey." Moses said to God, "But when I go to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your fathers has sent me to you,' if they ask me, 'What is his name?' what am I to tell them?" God replied, "I AM WHO AM." Then he added, "This is what you shall tell the Israelites: I AM sent me to you."

God spoke further to Moses, "Thus shall you say to the Israelites: 'The Lord, the

God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob, has sent me to you.' This is my name forever; thus am I to be remembered through all generations."

**R** —A proclamation from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians

I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud and all passed through the sea, and all of them were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea. All ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink, for they drank from a spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was the Christ.

Yet God was not pleased with most of them, for they were struck down in the desert.

These things happened as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil things, as they did. Do not grumble as some of them did, and suffered death by the destroyer. These things happened to them as an example, and they have been written down as a warning to us, upon whom the end of the ages has come.

Therefore, whoever thinks he is standing secure should take care not to fall.

**GLOSSARY:** *Horeb:* Another name for Mount Sinai, the very important site where Moses received his mission from the Lord and the Ten Commandments, and where he sealed the Covenant between the people of Israel and the Lord God.

Some people told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with the blood of their sacrifices. Jesus said to them in reply, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were greater sinners than all other Galileans? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did! Or those eighteen people who were killed when the tower at Siloam fell on them – do you think they were more guilty than everyone else who lived in Jerusalem? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did!"

And he told them this parable: "There once was a person who had a fig tree planted in his orchard, and when he came in search of fruit on it but found none, he said to the gardener, 'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should it exhaust the soil?' The gardener said to him in reply, 'Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it. It may bear fruit in the future. If not, you can cut it down.'"

### Homily

#### Profession of Faith

*(Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed)*

**All**—I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. **C**—That, like the gardener in today's parable, we may intercede for our brothers and sisters and help them grow in holiness, let us pray! **R.**

**C**—That all of us may bear fruits of sincere repentance, reconciliation and active involvement in promoting the good of the community, let us pray! **R.**

**C**—Let us pray in silence for our personal intentions.  
*(Pause)* Let us pray! **R.**

**P**—O God, You have been so patient with us, putting up with our lack of zeal and moral failings. Strengthen us in our resolve to live an authentic Christian life, filled with works of mercy and love. We ask this through Jesus, our Model and Savior who lives and loves forever and ever.  
**All—Amen!**

## The Call to Produce Abundant Fruit

**F**ig trees planted in vineyards receive preferential treatment – well-tilled soil, good manure, protection from vandals and animals. If for one year they do not bear fruit, they are without excuse. The decision of the owner of the vineyard in today’s Gospel to have the barren fig tree cut down is more than justified. Its performance had definitely been disappointing. (See Lk 13:7.)

But barrenness is not a defect that can be found only in trees. It can also be found in people. *Spiritual and moral barrenness* means the absence of those dispositions and actions which God has a right to expect from us. Unfortunately, in spite of the much care and love we have received from Him, our response is often disappointing.

In most cases, it is not a matter of laziness. We are very active. We do many things. We may even give the impression that we are achieving a lot . . . Many of our actions, however, suck most of our vital energies but leave us spiritually “deflated” . . . We are constantly in danger of forgetting that **what matters is not how many things we do, but rather, WHAT we do, HOW and WHY we do them. We are expected to bear fruits of holiness by doing our duty to the best of our ability and out of love for God and our neighbor.** This is what really matters in life.

The Lord, of course, is usually patient. But His patience should not be taken to mean that He has become unable to check our misbehavior. It simply means that, in His love, and thanks to the intercession of Jesus, He “gives us another chance.” But a day will come when we will have to account even for these additional signs of love.

These are days of grace; days for an honest evaluation of our performance in the light of God’s generosity and of His expectation. If we discover that our life is so full of “leaves” but lacks the fruits of piety, gratitude, honesty, generosity, purity, sense of responsibility, faith, hope, love . . . we have only one thing to do: **to repent of our sins and change for the better.** In the first part of today’s Gospel, Jesus uses the verb “repent” twice, both as an **exhortation** and as a **warning.** (See vv. 3 and 5.)

But he does more than just exhort and warn us. He also intercedes for us with the Father, and **offers us his help** to rid us from our barrenness. His **teaching, his example, and his grace** will produce the miracle, only if we cooperate with him.

This might be our last chance to finally start producing the long-awaited fruits which will delight our divine Master. They will delight our very selves in the first place.



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
