Entrance Antiphon

(To be recited only when no Entrance Hymn is sung.)

O sing a new song to the Lord, for he has worked wonders; in the sight of the nations he has shown his deliverance, alleluia!

Greeting

P –Blessed be God who has made everything new through the resurrection of His Son. May His grace and peace be with you all!

All—**And with your spirit!**

Penitential Act

P –As we prepare to celebrate the Sacred Mysteries, let us call to mind our sins and realize the great harm they cause to ourselves and our neighbor. *(Pause)*

P –Lord Jesus, you enjoined your disciples to love one another, but we have failed to live by your commandment. Lord, have mercy!

All—**Lord, have mercy!**

P –Lord Jesus, you taught your disciples that brotherly/sisterly love should be our distinctive mark, but we have often hurt our neighbor. Christ, have mercy!

All—**Christ, have mercy!**

P –Lord Jesus, love for our neighbor will be the decisive issue at the Final Judgment, but we have often ignored your warning. Lord, have mercy!

All—**Lord, have mercy!**

P –May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life.

All—**Amen!**

Gloria

All –Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father.

Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen!

Collect (Opening Prayer)

P –Almighty ever-living God, constantly accomplish the Paschal Mystery within us, that those you were pleased to make new in Holy Baptism may, under your protective care, bear much fruit and come to the joys of life eternal.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

LITURGY OF THE WORD



1st Reading Acts 14:21-27

Paul and Barnabas are concluding their first missionary journey. With wisdom and foresight, they organize the communities of believers by appointing local leaders for each of them to ensure their orderly development.

R –A proclamation from the Acts of the Apostles

After Paul and Barnabas had proclaimed the good news to the city (of Derbe) and made a considerable number of disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch. They strengthened the spirits of the disciples and exhorted them to persevere in the faith, saying, “It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God.”

They appointed elders for them in each church and, with prayer and fasting, commended them to the Lord in whom they had put their faith. Then they traveled through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. After proclaiming the word at Perga, they went down to Attalia. From there they sailed to Antioch, where they had been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now accomplished.

And when they arrived, they called the church together and reported what God had done with them and how he had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles.

GLOSSARY: • **Antioch:** An ancient city of Syria, on the Orontes River, north of Lebanon, and just a few kilometers from the Mediterranean Sea. Antioch became the see of the second most numerous and important Christian community after Jerusalem. It was in Antioch that the disciples of Jesus were called “Christians” for the first time. It was from that city that Paul and Barnabas were sent on their first missionary journey. It was still from Antioch that Paul set out on his second and third missionary journeys.

Homily

Profession of Faith

(Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed)

All—I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, *(bow)* and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.** For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

C—That our Christian communities may rise above the predominant attitudes of indifference, selfishness, and vengefulness, we pray. . . **R.**

C—That we may be able to forgive those who offended us and never harbor feelings of grudge and revenge, we pray. . . **R.**

C—That we may not fail to show loving concern for our neighbor, especially the sick, the poor, and the marginalized, we pray! **R.**

C—Let us pray in silence for our personal intentions.
(Pause) We pray! **R.**

P—Lord Jesus Christ, grant us the grace to show our love through acts of compassion, generosity and forgiveness, in imitation of you who were born, lived and died for love of us, and now continue to love and care for ever and ever.
All—Amen!

P—Pray, brethren . . .

All—May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.

Prayer over the Offerings

P—O God, who by the wonderful exchange effected in this sacrifice have made us partakers of the one supreme Godhead, grant, we pray, that, as we have come to know your truth, we may make it ours by a worthy way of life.

Through Christ our Lord.
All—Amen!

Preface of Easter II

P—The Lord be with you!

All—And with your spirit!

P—Lift up your hearts!

All—We lift them up to the Lord!

P—Let us give thanks to the Lord our God!

All—It is right and just!

P—It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, at all times to acclaim you, O Lord, but in this time above all to praise you yet more gloriously, when Christ our Passover has been sacrificed.

Through him the children of light rise to eternal life and the halls of the heavenly Kingdom are thrown open to the faithful; for his Death is our ransom from death, and in his rising the life of all has risen.

Breaking of the Bread

All—Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world: have mercy on us. (2x)

Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world: grant us peace.

Communion

P –Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the Supper of the Lamb.

All–Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed.

Communion Antiphon

A NEW WORLD BUILT ON LOVE

We Christians have something wonderful to look forward to: a totally “new world.” This will consist in a condition of perfect happiness, characterized by the absence of any form of suffering and by the deepest experience of God’s saving presence. (See today’s Second Reading, especially vv. 3-4.)

Such a world, so different from the present one, will not be the product of man’s ingenuity, planning or efforts. By ourselves we are incapable of creating our own heaven. We are even unable to conceive it in our imagination, for we do not know what is really fulfilling for us.

The “new world” we so eagerly await is the creation of God’s love for us. He alone knows what can make us really happy forever. He alone can make this plan a reality.

Yet, such a new world – the new Jerusalem – will not be simply a priceless gift distributed indiscriminately to all men, including those who persistently reject it. God treats us as adults. He respects our freedom and values our cooperation. He actually solicits it, gently and constantly. He wants us to be the ones who supply the labor, while He supplies the planning, the bricks, the mortar and the stones needed to build the “world” in which alone we will feel at home. In this way, the world without tears, death, mourning . . . will be not only a gift from God, but also the fruit of our loyalty and perseverance, as well as of the pain we endured with love.

In practice, then, **the “new world” will be the result of two loves: God’s love for us, and our love for Him and our neighbor.** This is quite an uneven partnership, for there is no comparison between God’s role and ours. Yet, it is God Himself who has chosen us as His “partners.” It is His love which transforms our suffering and feeble efforts into the splendor of the “house of love” that we call “heaven.”

That final result will be like a splendid flower blossoming out of a dark, small, unattractive seed – the seed of our life on earth . . . The vital force that makes our poor efforts produce such a disproportionate result is our Christ-like love, the self-sacrificing love of God and neighbor which Jesus taught his disciples with his example, even more than with his words.

A love patterned after that of Jesus for his disciples is the only valid passport that will enable us to enter the “new Jerusalem,” our true homeland. Without a Christ-like love, we would feel total strangers and out of place in God’s Kingdom. With it, we shall feel perfectly at home, and enjoy the fruit of even the tiniest acts of brotherly/sisterly love done in imitation of **Jesus, “the Teacher of love.”**



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
